20	ROLL CALL/APPROVAL OF AGENDA
21 22 23	The meeting was convened at 9:00 a.m. The meeting was also properly noticed. The notice and affidavit are on file with the District Office at 5672 Strand Court, Naples, FL 34110. All supervisors were present at the meeting, establishing a quorum.
24 25	On a MOTION by Mr. Sieperda and a second by Mr. Hall the agenda was approved as presented with all in favor.

- 26 APPROVAL OF MINUTES NOVEMBER 2024
- 27 Page 2 line 12 should say Watch Ln

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- 1 Page 2 line 12 Point should be changed to Pointe
- 2 Under Managers Report add "Introduction by District Manager as to the competitive
- 3 solicitation process"
- Page 5 line 12 add "The Board members evaluated the proposals and presentations
 and provided their rankings and delivered them to the District Manager."
- 6 The minutes were approved as amended on a MOTION by Mr. Smith, a second by 7 Mr. Hall and all in favor.

8 PUBLIC COMMENT

9 No public comment was received at this time.

10 FINANCIALS

- 11 Mr. Dorrill presented the financials from October, marking the first month of the fiscal
- 12 year. The total revenue received was \$3.3 million, which represents nearly 71% of the
- 13 annual revenue from non-ad-valorem taxes. The District currently holds \$205,000 in
- cash, with \$65,000 allocated to the operating fund and \$141,000 in the reserve account.
- 15 There were \$125,000 in outstanding payables.

16 The financials accepted as presented on a MOTION by Mr. Smith, a second by Mr.

17 Giannetti and all in favor.

18 MANAGER'S REPORT

19 A. US 41 Design/Build Contract

- 20 Mr. Dorrill was in discussions with Heatherwood Construction during the week of
- 21 Thanksgiving. Heatherwood is the preferred/number one ranked firm from the previous
- 22 meeting. Mr. Dorrill provided them with a copy of the standard form of agreement from
- the American Institute of Architects. A tentative meeting is scheduled for two weeks
- after Christmas to continue the discussion. The goal is to have a draft agreement for Mr.
- 25 Pires' review before the next meeting.

26 B. FEMA Flood Elevation

- 27 The FEMA flood maps adopted in February included a change to the finished floor
- 28 elevation which appears to work in favor of the District, as it will not be necessary to
- raise the floor by two feet. Mr. Dorrill provided a copy of an email from the District's Civil

- 1 Engineer. Mr. Brown explained that FEMA periodically revises the flood assessment
- 2 maps. According to the new map and the Florida Building Code, the District is no longer
- 3 required to raise the elevation and can process the upcoming work as an insubstantial
- 4 change.
- 5 Regarding the porte-cochere, fire patrols can grant a variance from the 20-foot
- 6 standard. It is anticipated that the road will need to be widened to accommodate a new
- 7 median that will support the porte-cochere column.

8 C. FY 25 Lakebank Restoration

- 9 American Shoreline Restoration is the vendor for the annual Lakebank Restoration
- 10 process, which will address approximately ³/₄ of a mile of lake erosion. Mr. Vanover
- 11 shared information about some of the adjacent neighborhoods included in the program.
- 12 The golf course has about 1,000 feet of lakebank included in the project and adjacent
- 13 neighborhoods affected are Ivy Pointe, Le Chateau, Tiburon, and Troon Lakes,
- 14 specifically the non-residential side of Troon Lakes. Staff will hold a preconstruction
- 15 conference with neighborhood representatives and presidents from each of these
- 16 communities if there is interest in it. The total cost is \$155,480, reflecting an increase
- 17 from \$42 per foot to \$46 per foot.

18 **The contract from American Shoreline Restoration in the amount of \$155,480 was**

approved on a MOTION by Mr. Sieperda, a second by Mr. Hall, and all in favor.

20 ATTORNEY'S REPORT

- 21 A. Osprey/Point License Agreement
- 22 Mr. Vanover has sent out this license agreement per Mr. Pires

The license agreement was approved on a MOTION by Mr. Giannetti, a second by

- 24 Mr. Sieperda and all in favor
- 25 ENGINEER'S REPORT
- 26 No report was given at this time.

27 SUPERVISOR'S REQUEST

28 A. Tiburon Estates Garbage

- 29 Mr. Sieperda requested adding a trash receptacle to the roundabout. Mr. Vanover will
- 30 investigate it.

1 **B. Traffic Study**

- 2 Traffic count to happen in season in order to evaluate if four-way stop is needed at
- 3 Watercress. Mr. Dorrill will talk with Mr. Brown about getting that scheduled.
- A supervisor raised concerns about the illumination at that intersection, stating that it is inadequate. Mr. Brown and Mr. Vanover will look into it.

6 PUBLIC COMMENT

- 7 A resident from Watercress thanked the Board for their service to the community. He
- 8 asked for a plan for updating the designs for the other two gate houses per Mr. Adams
- 9 recommendations. Mr. Giannetti shared that Mr. Adams wants to wait for the US 41
- 10 architect to share designs before planning out the other two. The resident also raised
- 11 concerns about security and Airport not having 24-hour service. Mr. Giannetti said they
- 12 will investigate it.
- 13 Abby Barnes Egrets Walk Ms. Barnes inquired about the use of Roundup and
- 14 glyphosate, expressing concerns about the health and safety of these chemicals. Mr.
- 15 Vanover explained that they primarily use Atrazine to spray broadleaf plants during the
- 16 winter. He also noted that Roundup is widely used around the world and is approved for
- 17 use by the University of Florida's Agriculture program.
- 18 Joan Vogel Egrets Walk Ms. Vogel shared that there is a problem with the low
- 19 voltage landscape lighting in the garden beds on Oakmoss at the intersection of Sweet
- 20 Bay and Egrets Walk. She shared that recently the intersection was completely dark,
- 21 except for the light post at Spanish Moss. Illumination at that intersection depends
- completely on the landscape lighting. Mr. Brown confirmed that a light is supposed to be
- 23 there and will look into the issue.

- 25 With no further comments, the meeting was adjourned **on a MOTION by Mr. Giannetti,**
- and a second by Mr. Sieperda, at 9:38 a.m. The next meeting will be January 15,
